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Monsters in Kansas Classrooms!

During the last two weeks in October, twelve classes from grades K-6 participated in the annual Monster Exchange Project. This project focuses on descriptive writing, following directions, and teamwork.

Each class created a unique monster, wrote instruc-

tions, then exchanged instructions with a partner-teacher. Partners then created a second monster based on the new instructions. The partner classes connected over IDL from Wisconsin, New York, Texas, and Canada.

For the connection, students began with where they were located in the U.S. Some classes shared maps and posters to tell

about their community and school. Then students compared monsters and discussed differences and similarities. Students made observations on how they could have wrote the directions differently to have different outcomes. Or they gained insight on how other students may interpret things differently.

After the monsters were discussed in detail, the students were able to have a question & answer time with their partner class. Students had the opportunity to ask any type of question. Some common questions were what was on the menu for lunch that day and what was the weather like. Younger classes discussed what type of play ground equipment each had, and what time

they attended school. This gave the students the opportunity to learn about the partner class's school and community, while teaching them about their own.

Feedback from educators that participated in this event:

- The students learned to work cooperatively and learned to read and write directions.
- The students enjoyed this and really got the point about writing clear directions.
- This was a fun way for the students to learn the importance of details.

This is a collaboration between two classes sharing a common goal. This exchange is just like the Monster Exchange (featured on page I) but with a Snowman theme. Each class will create a Snowman, write directions, exchange directions, and create a



second Snowman. Then they will connect over videoconference to share the results.

This project is free to participate in.


KSDE Conference 2010 ***

This year during the KSDE Annual Conference, KAIDE (Kansas Association for Interactive Distance Education) hosted several sessions focusing on Videoconferencing in the classroom. The theme for the conference was "Embracing Our Future" and what better way than through videoconferencing! The benefits of using this technology in your district is becoming increasingly obvious. You not only can share teachers, classes, and projects, but attend meetings and field trips without leaving the classroom.

Presenter Janine Lim (Instructional Technology Consultant for Berrien RESA in Michigan) showed ways to not only incorporate videoconferencing into your curriculum, but ways to find what you are looking for as well. There are many resources to use that are just a click away!

Ryan Schafer from Johnson NASA Space Center in Houston gave an overview of the programs that the NASA centers have to offer the K-I2 classrooms. These programs are curriculum rich and available when you need them. The program topics vary depending on the NASA center and are always free!

Two sessions were presented by Paul Heironymus (Content Adviser, Northern Ohio Research & Technology Hub). Paul used videoconferencing technology as well as online tools to make the pres-



For the last session, the KAIDE officers joined together with IDL teachers, vendors, facilitators, and providers to create an IDL Panel. This panel was a chance for participants to ask questions about videoconferencing and have someone from the panel with the expertise to answer the question. This also showed how closely all of the IDL Networks in Kansas work together for a common goal of positively impacting students with videoconferencing in education.
